Age Friendly Ireland Programme Mangers Residential Meeting

This week our local Programme managers came together for our yearly residential meeting to discuss our Age Friendly Work Plan for the year.



The two-day session reviewed our key objectives for the year ahead and how we can improve and grow the programme further throughout Ireland.







On day two if was all about collaborations where we had wonderful guest speakers. Meadhbh Haiceid from Libraries Development LGMA spoke about Libraries Ireland and Ireland Reads, Clare McNally spoke about Adult Literacy for Life, Orlaith Carmody who is the Age Friendly Business Principle Advisors spoke about the Age Friendly Business Recognition Programme and Kathleen Goulding from the Central Statistics Office gave an overview of Key Statistics on Ageing.

Overall it was a very product meeting, great to get everyone together to discuss and brainstorm.

AgeWell Summerhill, Co Meath wins an European Economic and Social Committee flagship Civil Society Prize





AgeWell, a project of the Third Age Foundation based in Summerhill, Co Meath is among the final five international contenders for the European Economic and Social Committee (EESC's) 14th Civil Society Prize awarded to non-profit projects supporting mental health.

AgeWell is a social engagement network that improves well-being among older people who are isolated, frail and vulnerable. Using a combination of in-house visits and a smartphone application, it offers companionship and emotional support to those who lack them and identifies health risks at an early stage. AgeWell Companions, trained by Third Age who visit weekly, enrich their own lives as well as those of others.

AgeWell is supported and funded by Slaintecare.

The winners were chosen from over 100 applications from 23 Member States. The total prize money of €50 000 will be shared among the five front-runners. The winner of the first prize will take home €14 000 and the other four finalists will each







receive €9 000. The award ceremony takes place on March 7 in Civil Society Week in Brussels.

The Slovakian project promotes compassionate understanding of mental health among young people. A community centre in Finland offers people with mental health difficulties a nurturing and inclusive environment to enjoy nature and culture. A second prize-winning Finnish project has developed two games set in a futuristic world of hope and designed to support mental health. 'Telling Stories for Good' from Italy raises awareness among four million people suffering from anorexia by rewriting stereotypical narratives on eating disorders.

Welcoming the news of AgeWell's achievement, Aine Brady, CEO of Third Age said: 'AgeWell started as a pilot in 2018, where we began providing weekly visits to older people in and around Summerhill village. Its success led to its expansion to all of Co Meath. To date, 510 older people have benefitted. They are typically lonely, frail, at risk, and we support them to remain in their own homes'.

The programme has a number of unique aspects, she says. 'Every fortnight our Companions use a 20 Question App with each client so that any changes in physical, emotional and social health are noted, with the client referred as necessary to a range of services. The App also monitors any new symptoms such as confusion, changes in mobility, falls, decline in appetite, or pain. This works as an early warning system identifying and addressing health, social and environmental problems before they escalate'. she says.

Each AgeWell client receives a baseline assessment on entering the project and is reassessed every four months. Assessments invariably show and increase in social engagement, physical activity and a reduction in loneliness.

Transition Year students from Colaiste Muire, Ennis, Co.Clareare on taking part in the YSI project this year. Their idea is to eliminate older people loneliness in their community. Their project name is the Senior Smile Squad.

'In order to do this we have gone to Clarecastle day care centre in groups and spent an hour with the visitors there. We played bingo with them, did arts and crafts, painted their nails, played trad music, Irish danced and got to know them.

One day we went in to Sisters of Mercy, St. Xavier's Convent in our town as the nuns that set up our school are connected to this convent.'







'We also have gone uptown during our lunchtimes and interviewed people. We asked them questions like "What makes you smile?" "What makes you feel valued?" We also set up social media accounts on TikTok , instagram , twitter/X. On these accounts we have posted our interviews, happy quotes to make people smile and TikTok videos to spread awareness about older people loneliness.'

The Limerick Opera, has as it's immediate aim, to bring opera to all.

Access to the arts is an issue for some communities and this project aims to introduce opera to the community in a non-formal setting. By facilitating and supporting access to the various performances, it is hoped to broaden the possibilities for older community members to enjoy operatic performances.

This series of events will give older people an opportunity to participate in cultural activities (specifically music appreciation, through operatic performance, discovering different aspects of opera music in a social setting) in order to realise their creative potential and improve their quality of life.

Established in 2019, The Limerick Opera Festival was created to bring opera to all through a wide variety of live performances, operatic renditions, exhibitions and community events. The Limerick Opera Festival will host a number of events ranging from performances on street to gala performances.

Thursday May 16th 2024 Lecture on the life of Catherine Hayes, Laurel Hill School, South Circular Road

Catherine Hayes, married name Catherine Bushnell (1818 – 1861) was a world-famous Irish soprano of the Victorian era. According to London's Daily Express 'Hayes was the 'Madonna' of her day. She was the 19th century operatic equivalent of the world's most famous pop star'. Our lecture will be delivered by Ms Kathryn Hayes, Lecturer and Course Director of the BA in Journalism and New Media programme, University of Limerick since 2016. Ms Hayes is responsible for the design, delivery and assessment of a number of modules in the BA in Journalism and

Local historian Sharon Slater will take us on an amazingly interesting and informative walk around Limerick city showing us places of interest with an operatic theme. Catherine Hayes Tribute Concert, St Mary's Cathedral, Saturday May 25th

This will be a reprise of last year's very successful concert highlighting the arias and classical songs performed by Catherine Hayes during her impressive career as the Hibernian Madonna. In her lifetime as a Prima Donna, she met such historical figures as Manual Garcia, the famous tenor and singing teacher; Franz Liszt, the virtuosic pianist and Hungarian composer; Queen Victoria and Giuseppe Verdi himself. She sang everything from Moore's Melodies to Italian songs and arias and was known from Australia to America and everywhere in between. We will have two operatic performers accompanied by the wonderful timbre of St Mary's grand piano.
