OVER €462,000 IN COMMUNITY COVID-19 ADAPTATION FUNDS FOR CAVAN TOWNS AND VILLAGES

Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD, announced details of €462,193 for towns and villages in County Cavan to help them adjust to COVID-19 restrictions. The funding is being delivered under the Accelerated Measure of the Town and Village Renewal Scheme 2020.

Minister Humphreys said "Our rural towns and villages have always played a huge role in supporting businesses and communities by providing spaces for people to meet, socialise and shop locally. The scheme is now more important

than ever to assist businesses and communities to address the challenges that COVID-19 has brought to their towns and villages."

Following the announcements,
Chief Executive of Cavan County
Council Mr Tommy Ryan
welcomed the timely
investments in our towns and
villages by the Department of
Rural and Community
Development. "These funds will
help equip our rural communities
to adapt to the new reality in
which we find ourselves,
providing a boost to the social
and economic fabric of these
towns and villages as we learn to

live alongside Covid-19."

Cathaoirleach of Cavan
County Council Cllr Sarah
O'Reilly added, "Our
communities have shown
extraordinary resilience over the
past eight months and this latest
round of funding is a welcome
acknowledgement of that effort.
These new community facilities
will empower rural communities
to maintain a good quality of life,
combat social isolation, and
incentivise economic activity
while also adhering strictly to
public health measures."

LEADER PROGRAMME

The Local Community Development Committee acts as the Local Action Group [LAG] for the LEADER Programme. The LAG met a total of 9 times over the course of the year with meetings held remotely due to COVID restrictions from April onwards and all members embraced this technology and worked with the Implementing Partner Cavan County Local Development and Cavan County Council to ensure that the Leader Programme was kept on track.

As of 31st December all funding under the 14-20 Programme was fully committed this amounted to a total of €6,844,368 for projects across the three themes of the programme.

TRANSITION PROGRAMME

The Transition programme was announced by Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD on the 16th December 2020 will help to bridge the gap between end of the 2014-2020 LEADER Programme and the start of the next EU programme.

With an initial allocation of €20 million to support locally-led rural development and focus on building capacity in communities, the

programme will come into effect from 1st April 2021.

The key features announced by the Minister were:

An initial allocation of €20 million available to cover both new projects and the administration costs of the Local Action Groups who deliver the programme. Project approvals under the Transitional Programme will commence from 1st April 2021.

A key focus of the Transitional Programme will be on building capacity within communities which have not received LEADER funding to date. The programme will also support job creation, foster and encourage entrepreneurship, and support projects which address the climate agenda, digital transformation and encourage rural communities to build on their existing strengths and assets.

€14.49 MILLION SECURED FOR LANDMARK ABBEYLANDS RE-DEVELOPMENT

Minister for Housing, Local Government, and Heritage, Mr Darragh O'Brien announced that €14.49 million has been provisionally allocated to the Cavan Town Abbeylands Masterplan project under the Urban Regeneration Development Fund (URDF).

Minister O'Brien said: "This funding will support projects in the

North-East that will enhance quality of life for many people. The projects are all about making these areas more attractive places in which to live, work, visit and invest.

These three projects focus on regenerating town centres, an important priority for this Government, through a mixture of works to create public spaces,

centres for working and community, and works to connect areas in the towns. I believe this funding can be a catalyst for regeneration, development, and growth. It will also provide much-needed economic stimulus and job creation in Cavan, Louth and Monaghan as our economy emerges from the depths of the pandemic."

MEALS ON WHEELS

During the month of April as the Food Hubs were successfully delivering food parcels to households across the county a number of calls were made to the Local Authority COVID Response helpline regarding Meals on Wheels. Unfortunately, many Meals on Wheels' services had closed due to the crisis and many vulnerable and older people could not access this vital support.

After notifying Cavan County Local Development the SICAP staff team in CCLD engaged with the Services for Older Persons in the HSE to see what funding support could be made available. Following discussions with the HSE funding was quickly approved and a Meals on Wheels Service was established on the 24th April. The initiave was simple, CLLD used the HSE funding to lease a refrigerated van while Cavan Civil Defence provided the vehicle insurance cover and a driver.

The meals were then purchased from Swift Fine Foods in county Monaghan who are the largest producer of ready-meals in Ireland and then delivered to a number of older people who had been identified as needing support. The Meals on Wheels has grown from strength to strength with over 100 older people receiving meals weekly across county Cavan with the van driver now being an RSS participant and the vehicle insurance costs funded by the HSE.



THE PARALLEL STORY

Food Cloud Hubs are a social enterprise operating in Ireland since 2014. They are funded by the Department of Rural and Community Development under the Community Services Programme (CSP). They act as a redistribution centre to both minimise food waste and alleviate hunger and poverty.

COVID-19 increased demand from charity partners nationwide of the services of Food Cloud but the organisation did not have sufficient capacity to upscale at the pace required. At the same time SICAP Programmes delivered by other Local Development Companies (LDCs) were also identifying a need on the ground for food provisions and supports for vulnerable groups. LDCs employ approx. 2,100 staff funded from a range of sources including RSS, Tús, SICAP and LEADER. Many LDC activities that were funded could not operate as normal due to COVID-19 confinement measures but had staff and vehicles to support Food Cloud Hubs in food redistribution.

As a result, a collaborative approach was developed between Food Cloud and LDCs to facilitate upscaling of their operations and reach into the marginalised communities that Local Development Companies support. LDCs bordering food distribution centres provided staff directly to these centres to assist in logistics regarding the collection and delivery of food. Furthermore, using the template developed by Cavan

County Local Development food bank services were established in counties where this provision was not available and in other counties existing provision was up-scaled also via this partnership. At its peak twenty-one other counties were receiving supports via this collaboration. Thirteen of these other collaborations had LDCs as the main or sole partners and the other eight counties partnerships already existed but LDCs were assisting in the effort to upscale.

FOOD STRATEGY

The 2017-2022 Cavan Food Strategy aims to promote a more coordinated and collaborative approach to the development of the 'Cavan Food Product'. The implementation of the actions set out in the strategy are strengthening our current food initiatives, encouraging new activity and supporting all those involved in the food sector in Cavan.

The External Working Group consisting of representatives from industry including chefs, producers and the educational sector together with staff members from Cavan County Council met throughout 2020 to progress actions that were identified as priorities of the Cavan Food Strategy – with the Covid-19 pandemic leading to meetings being moved online.

In February 2020 'Created in Cavan' a new compelling brand identity for the development and promotion of the Cavan food movement was launched by Chef Neven Maguire. A brand toolkit has been provided which is guiding the brand usage across all marketing communications platforms. The first edition of the Cavan food and drink producer directory was also published which showcases the great variety of top class produce that is available in Co Cavan.

The Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine under the Rural Innovation and Development Fund (RIDF) Agri-Food Tourism measures awarded funding to part finance initiatives in 2020 supported by Cavan County Council including:

CIC3: Celebrity Chef Neven Maguire of MacNean House and Restaurant addresses guests at the launch of the new 'Created in Cavan' food and drink brand for County Cavan.

- Digital Marketing Campaign to increase the social media reach of the new brand platforms Key messages of the campaign were to promote the local food industry and to further encourage consumers to support local businesses particularly as the sector has been so badly affected by the Covid-19 pandemic.
- Promotional video and materials for 'Created in Cavan'.
- Identification and development of potential food tourism offerings in Co. Cavan.
- A website www.createdincavan.ie was developed by Cavan County Council in partnership with Cavan Food Network, this website creates a comprehensive online information point for all things concerning Cavan food and drink and increases the consumer profile of Cavan food and beverage producers.

An online Cavan Food Network event titled "Cavan Food Sector - 2021 Sales Recovery Seminar" was held on Wednesday 18th November and attended by 25 food stakeholders.



LOOK FOR LOCAL

'Look for Local' is a communications campaign to encourage the public and businesses to seek out products and services from businesses in their local area. By supporting local businesses, they are supporting jobs in local communities too. The Local Enterprise Offices, through the Trading Online Voucher Scheme helped many businesses transform how they provide goods and services online, making it easier to buy from them than ever before. There was a very successful national campaign which drove this message home, Look for Local, support local jobs, communities and businesses.

CAVAN AGE FRIENDLY PROGRAMME SUPPORTING OLDER PEOPLE DURING THE COVID19 PANDEMIC

At an early stage, following the onset of the Covid19 pandemic it was evident that its impact was to be hardest felt by the older and most vulnerable people in our communities. In an effort to support our older people, and in recognition of the large number of older people who do not use the internet to access information, the Cavan Age Friendly Programme working with the agencies from the Cavan Age Friendly Alliance prepared 'Age Friendly Covid19 Information Packs' for distribution to older people across the county. The information packs contained leaflets on the services and supports available in response to Covid19.

They included information on the Community Call Helpline, Meals on Wheels, the Good Morning Cavan telephone befriending service operated by Positive Age Cavan, CMETB's technical support service to assist older people in learning to use the internet, the Cavan Library Service book delivery service, An Garda Siochana safety and crime prevention information and the GAA's 'It's Good to Talk' initiative, where local footballers phoned older people in their communities for a friendly chat.

The packs also contained information on initiatives aimed at encouraging older people to keep active while cocooning. These included a Simple Exercises leaflet developed by the HSE Community Physiotherapy Department which gave step by step instructions on simple exercises which could be done in the home to counteract frailty and muscle weakening resulting from lack of movement. Details were also included on the

County Museum's 'Share Your Story 2020' project where people could share their story of living through the pandemic, an extraordinary period in history and the Cavan Heritage Office project 'Where we belong', which encouraged people to engage with our heritage, in our local communities.

In total, 4,000 information packs were prepared by the staff of the Cavan Age Friendly Programme and Covid19 Volunteers. The packs were distributed to older people free of charge by An Post, An Garda Siochana, the Cavan County Local Development Company, HSE Public Health Nurses & Home Help and Cavan GAA.

Loughlan House Open Centre donated flowers and plants from its horticultural facility for distribution to older people living in County Cavan. Cavan Civil Defence delivered the flowers to older and vulnerable people across the county while delivering food parcels and meals on wheels. Working with the Age Friendly Programme and Civil Defence, Loughlan House donated a further batch of flowers and plants to Cavan Alzheimer's Society's Dementia Friendly Garden at the Cavan Day Care Centre on Cathedral Road in Cavan Town. Mr Mark Lydon, Governor Loughlan House and Mr Simon Duffy, Chief Officer, Loughlan House expressed their delight in being able to support such a worthy initiative. Members of Cavan Alzheimer's Association expressed their heartfelt appreciation at the kind gesture and have promised send photographs and to invite representatives from Loughlan House to visit the garden in the near future.

Once prepared, the packs were delivered to older people by Cavan GAA, An Garda Siochana, HSE Public Health Nurses and via Meals on Wheels provided by Cavan County Local Development Company and St. Vincent De Paul. This initiative was delivered by the Cavan Age Friendly Programme under the KEEPWELL Campaign, thanks to Healthy Ireland, an initiative of the Government of Ireland with funding from the Healthy Ireland Fund and the Sláintecare fund, delivered by Pobal.

IRELAND READS A NEW NATIONAL DAY TO CELEBRATE READING!

Thursday February 25th was national 'Squeeze in a Read' day where people of all ages were invited to 'Take the Pledge' to devote some minutes to reading on the day. It is part of the Government's 'Keep Well' campaign, and a public library initiative!

To celebrate, Cavan County Library invited readers from all over the county to submit their photographs of 'squeezing in a read' for the Cavan Library Hall of Fame, and the response was amazing! The images were published on our FaceBook page, and on our website, and daily prizes were up for grabs for the best photograph. FUNDING FOR CAVAN TOWN

Funding of €404,000 for Cavan town was secured under Failte Ireland's Destination Towns funding scheme. Investment in public realm will take place around Townhall Street and Farnham Street, along with new tourist information and directional signage, public art, up-lighting, interpretation and a re-imagining of the heritage town trail.

CASE STUDY 1 - ANTI-DUMPING INITIATIVE 2020

Waste Prevention Enforcement, Education and Aducation led by Cavan County Council with CU WERLA and the Department of Environment, Climate and Communications under the Anti-Dumping Initiative 2020.

Project Time: 220 hours. Project Cost €64,672.49

Summary

This was a multifaceted waste prevention project undertaken by Cavan County Council in collaboration with the Connaught Ulster WERLA and the Dept of Environment, Climate and Communications to refurbish the Council's Recycling Bring Centre Network. It involved abatement measures, installation of improved signage, installation of permanent CCTV surveillance (and lighting at selected locations) to enable future enforcement measures where necessary and education measures through the production of an 8 page information booklet and social media campaign.

Cavan County Council also s upported the "Your County, Your Waste" awareness and education campaign. Cavan County Council wish to acknowledge the assistance of the CU WERLA and the Department of Environment, Climate and Communications and the funding provided.

Case Study Details

Abatement Measures included the clean up and disposal of waste which had accumulated underneath and behind recycling receptacles at Kingscourt Bring Centre, Ballinagh Bring Centre and Ballyjamesduff Bring Centre prior to extensive refurbishment works taking place at each location.

Prevention Measures were taken by providing new informational signage at selected Bring Centre locations (which either had no previous signage or the existing signage needed upgrading) informing the public that it is an offence to leave behind any waste items at or near recycling receptacles, of the potential penalties for doing so and that that site is monitored by CCTV and information on GDPR. The Waste Management Section also worked closely with numerous Tidy Towns groups who play an influential environmental role in their community. These Tidy Towns groups will continue to work alongside the Council to ensure the amenities in receipt of these refurbishment works will be well

maintained in the future and enhance the area where they live and work.

Education Measures: The Waste Management Section designed an 8 page information booklet which was designed to to generate greater environmental awareness and education on what can be recycled and what to do if recycling receptacles are full.

Enforcement Measures: The Waste Management Section deployed permanent CCTV (a mixture of Overview HD Cameras and Licence Plate Recognition Cameras) at selected Bring Centre locations and explored the possibility of accessing footage from these sites or sites where CCTV is already in place remotely. Evidence retrieved from these cameras will be used to identify the vehicle registrations of those who commit an offence This evidence will be used to issue on the spot Litter Fines and/or court prosecutions.

Outcomes

Abatement Measures: 3.1 tonnes of waste was removed from the three sites mentioned above. Recycling receptacles were also power washed and any broken receptacles were replaced.

Prevention Measures: Extensive refurbishment works were undertaken at Bring Centres in Ballinagh, Ballyjamesduff and Kingscourt which included the installation of concrete plinth and boundary fence to define the Bring Centre Location, new informational signage and permanent CCTV. New informational signage was installed at an additional 5 No. Bring Centre locations, Cavan County Council are currently working with our service provider appointed to empty the recycling receptacles in rebranding the individual receptacle signage to make it more informative for the public and it is expected this rebranding will be completed across all 30 No. Bring Centres in 2021.

Education Measures: The 8 page information booklet is available to view online on our website www.cavancoco.ie and has been distributed to the public through our Green Schools and Tidy Towns networks. A sustained social media publicity campaign also took place during 2020 and will continue into 2021 to promote and influence positive behavioural change in order to keep these amenities free from litter and illegal dumping. The Council launched their 2020 "Green

Christmas" Campaign at our newly established Bring Centre in Cavan town which was attended by local Elected Members, members of Cavan Tidy Towns and staff from our service providers.

Enforcement Measures: CCTV was deployed at an additional 7 No. Bring Centre locations and an additional camera was deployed at an existing location. The Waste Management Section are in possession of evidence of littering/ illegal dumping from a number of these locations and are currently pursuing files under the Litter Pollution Act 1997 as amended and Waste Management Act 1996 as amended. It will also be possible to monitor CCTV at 6 No. sites via remote access and this should be available in Q1 2021.

Tip:

Improving the aesthetic appearance, capacity and efficiency of how our Bring Centres are managed will not only keep public spaces clean and eradicate pest problems, but it will also provide measurable environmental benefits by waste diversion from landfills. Providing more education and awareness campaigns will help increase awareness and create a more environmentally conscious culture across County Cavan.









HEALTHY CAVAN VIRTUAL 5K

All finishers received Healthy Cavan Medals and T-shirts. Photos were posted on social media of the participants in action throughout the 5 weeks. Over 450 people joined the virtual challenge.

CARE BOXES INITIATIVE BY HEALTHY CAVAN

Healthy Cavan has responded to the community response Covid-19 with a care box initiative. Funding from Pobal through the Healthy Ireland Initiative enables Cavan County Council to lead on a collaboration with Cavan HSE to provide Care Boxes to identified vulnerable adults during the Covid-19 pandemic. This Care Box initiative forms a strand of the wider Community Response Forum supports that the Cavan County Cavan, HSE and many other voluntary and statutory agents have thoughtfully worked together on during these challenging times.

Care boxes consist of personal care essentials, Covid-19 related information packs and Helpline numbers to support those most vulnerable within our locality. HSE Community Response leads, Orla Curran, Acting Principal Social

Worker and Margaret Barrett, Senior Speech & Language Therapist have collaborated internally with key HSE colleagues facilitating a careful identification of medically vulnerable clients to receive these care boxes. This Care Box initiative provides a timely practical support to those that are potentially alone and medically vulnerable at a time of crisis.

This showcase initiative is one of many of the Community Response Forum supports aiming to offer protective assistance to older & medically vulnerable people in receipt of HSE services. The heartfelt intention behind the Care Boxes is to enhance people's capacity to appropriately cocoon, stay safe and feel cared for at a time when it is most needed.

CAVAN ENERGY MASTERPLAN

The very real threat of global warming and the requirement to meet the ambitious targets set out in our Climate Action Plan have focused attention on the challenges of improving our energy usage. In response to this, the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI) encourage local communities to join the Sustainable Energy Community (SEC) network which supports everyone to work together to develop sustainable energy solutions for the benefit of their community. SECs are provided with Mentors by SEAI who will guide them through the options and processes available.

Cavan SEC is comprised of representatives from a number of public and community organisations across Cavan and is co-ordinated by Mary McCabe, Cavan County Local Development, SEAI County Mentor. The group recently completed an Energy Masterplan which establishes current annual energy usage in the county and its associated climate impact:

Energy Usage	370,000 tons oil
Energy Cost	€320 million
CO2 Emissions	1.4 million tons or 19 tons per person

The report highlights fuel poverty as a significant issue for Cavan. Fuel poverty occurs when a household spends 10% or more of its disposable income to keep the home adequately heated. The report identifies 39 localities in Cavan which are classified as high or very high risk of fuel poverty, accounting for 10% of the county's population.

However energy renovations in housing would largely alleviate fuel poverty and its impact on people's health.

The average BER for fuel poverty households in Cavan is E1 and getting them to the Climate Action Plan's target of B2 presents a significant challenge. This challenge has been taken on by a number of groups around the county who have joined SEAI's SEC network. SECs have been set up in many areas including Belturbet, Cootehill, East Cavan and Kingscourt where a group have specifically set out to target home improvements which will address fuel poverty in their

In recent times under the guidance of Cavan SEAI we in Kingscourt have formed our very own SEC (Sustainable Energy Community). The aim is to make our communities aware of the many energy saving initiatives that are available to them. These costs saving initiatives extend across our domestic households, community & sporting organisations and local businesses.

A number of members of the community have come together to establish this group to provide leadership on addressing the challenges of climate change by reducing energy use and using more renewable energy in homes across Kingscourt and beyond. ARTS 2020 - LEADERSHIP AND CAPACITY BUILDING IN ARTS AND HEALTH

Cavan County Council Arts Office established the Cavan Monaghan Arts and Health Forum in 2018 with CYPSI, Cavan County Council Healthy Ireland, Cavan Monaghan Mental Health Services, Mental Health Ireland, Breffni Integrated and specialist arts and health advocates.

The objective of this network is to work collaboratively to promote health and well-being through arts practice in a range of health and arts settings, among diverse communities creating the environment for arts participation

and collaboration using a person-centred approach.

Throughout 2020 the continuing professional development work with artists, health professionals and community leaders moved online. This transition was successful and the 25 attendees found the remote learning and sharing valuable. The programme included contributions from Julie Aldridge, Cork based artist and lecturer in art therapy, Louise Gartland, from Artonomy a professional art therapist and artist and Bernadette Kenny, Chief Executive of the Blue Box Creative Arts

Psychotherapy Centre, Limerick. Specific topics covered included Boundary, Self-Care, Loss and the Unknown. A peer exchange programme with 9 artists took place over a 7 week period last summer.

The Forum also provided creative arts experiences in visual arts and creative writing with young people, their parents and health specialists in the Cavan Monaghan area.

In late 2020 Cavan County Council advertised a contract for arts and health co-ordinator who will support this work and develop its reach.

ARTS IN EDUCATION

The Arts Offices of Monaghan and Cavan County Council with the Local Arts and Education Officer working with the Creative Associates, Ramor Theatre and Creative Ireland commissioned and disseminated theatre presentations for national and secondary school in Cavan/Monaghan for the final term in 2020. 260 school requests were received to share these performances with children in schools in both counties. The shows were Charles Dickens 'A Christmas Carol' from Livin Dred Theatre Company and Rockin Christmas Rhymes from Branar Theatre Company, Galway.

The arts office was part of the Creative Ireland programme that delivered Cruinniú June 2020 and the programme was delivered on the Cavan Monaghan Creative YouTube Channel.

Music Generation Cavan Monaghan was launched at Townhall Cavan in February 2020. It delivered a series of performance music education videos for schools and early years with their musicians during Lockdown and support the musician educators to develop skills in this area.
